Lemon Curd Cake

175g/6oz Soft margarine 100g/4oz Caster sugar

75ml/5tbsp Lemon curd 3 size 3 Eggs 225g/8oz Self-raising flour pinch of salt

Heat oven to 170°C / 335°F / Gas 3-4 Grease and line a 20.5cm/8in cake tin Cream the sugar and margarine together until light and fluffy. Then add the lemon curd and mix well. Beat in the eggs one at a time with a little flour and salt. Then fold in the remaining flour. Place the mixture in the prepared tin and bake for 1 hour until lightly browned. Leave to cool in tin. Serves 10

Class 123

Fruit Malt Loaf

6oz/150g Self raising flour 2 tbsp Malt drink powder

1oz/25g Caster or soft light brown sugar3oz/75g Sultanas2 tbsp Golden syrup½ pint/150ml Milk

Heat oven to 375°F/190°C/Gas 5.

Put all ingredients into a large bowl. Mix well together till a thick batter is formed.

Turn into well a greased 1lb/450g loaf tin. Bake for 1-1¼ hours or till a skewer inserted in the centre comes out clean. Turn out to cool onto a rack. Serve with butter.

Class 124 Blondies

175g Butter, cut into cubes, plus extra for the tin

200g Light brown soft sugar

100g Caster sugar

3 Eggs

1tsp Vanilla extract or bean paste

200g Plain flour

½tsp Baking powder

200g White chocolate, chopped, or use chocolate chips

Melt butter and both sugars in a pan over low heat, adding a pinch of salt if the butter is unsalted. Remove from the heat and leave to cool for 10 mins – this will stop the eggs from curdling when added. Heat oven to $180^{\circ}\text{C}/160^{\circ}\text{C}$ fan/gas 4. Butter 23cm square tin or 25x20cm baking tin and line with baking parchment.

Beat the eggs and vanilla into the cooled butter and sugar mixture until well combined. Sieve in the flour and baking powder, then gently fold until you have a smooth batter. Fold in the white chocolate, then put in the prepared tin. Smooth the top and bake for 40-45 mins until the edges are coming away from the sides of the tin, the top has a papery crust and a skewer inserted into the middle comes out with a few crumbs, but no liquid batter. The blondies will firm up as they cool. Leave to cool in the tin for 10 mins, then transfer to a wire rack to cool completely.
